At the meeting of Ennis Urban Council, alluding to references made by some members of the Kilrush Urban Council in connection with the Ennis Council selecting and fixing the 31st May for the forthcoming horse fair, two days preceding the Kilrush horse fair,

The Chairman said that was a matter he should like to refer to. He had seen a statement in the Press made by the Kilrush Councillors about their fixing the 31st of May for their horse fair. Some of the Kilrush people seemed to have grievances because they (the Urban Council) were to hold their fair on the 31st of May, because the Kilrush fair was to be held on the 2nd June. Unfortunately, they could not help that, because they had to change the date of the horse fair more than once in order to suit the buyers. But it was not to interfere in any way with the Kilrush fair that they fixed the 31st May for the fair. They first had the fair fixed and advertised for the 25th and 26th May, but they had letters from the North of Ireland buyers and English buyers stating that they could not attend the fair on those days as there were fairs in Clones and other places. They then finally changed the date of their fair to the 31st May, because they had no other date on which to hold it. They could not go into June for reasons—on account of Spancillhill and one thing and another. They could not possibly have their fair on any other day but the 31st of May. They would be very sorry to interfere with the Kilrush fair in any way, but, unfortunately, they had absolutely no choice but to hold the fair on the 31st May, or not to hold it at all.

Mr. Moloney did not see how the holding of the fair on the 31st May could injure the Kilrush fair. If anything they would profit by the exertions of the Council in bringing the leading buyers to the county.

The Chairman—The buyers who will attend our fair will go to Kilrush fair.

After some further discussion the matter dropped.

BURNING FATALITY NEAR KILMALLOCK.
