TEACHERS' FEES.

Mr. J. G. O'Brien asked how it was there was
an apparent disparity in the amount of the fees to
teachers.

Mr. Comerston said it arose through the closing
down of the temporary classes. It did not affect
the permanent teachers whose classes were kept
on, no matter what was the limit of the attend-
ance.

A conversation took place with reference to
equipment items, among the rest with regarding
to the

for the new technical institute.

Mr. Comerston read a minute from the Limerick
United Trades and Labour Council enclosing a
resolution in favour of having the work done by
local plumbers. The Amalgamated Society of
Plumbers also wrote and asked to have a deputa-
tion from their body heard on the subject.

Answering a number of questions put by
members,

Mr. Comerston said he believed the contract was
not yet given to Messrs Musgrave & Co., Belfast.
The ventilators that fitted the stone work were,
however, on the ground.

After some conversation,

Mr. Comerston read a letter from Mr. W. P.
Ryan, London, the architect of the Institute,
stating that hot water heating was not done by ordi-
nary plumbers, and that he had invited tenders from
Ireland, selecting Messrs. Musgrave, & Co.,
Belfast, as the most competent.

The Chairman asked if it was within the
providence of the architect to take such action
without the direction of the Committee.

Mr. Comerston explained that it was set out in
the agreement that the contractor should have the
work done.

Mr. Long said he inferred from Mr. Ryan's
letter that the contract was already given.

Mr. Lynch said the matter did not concern the
Committee altogether. They had made a contract
with Mr. Kenny, who was responsible to have the
work done subject to the approval of the architect.
It was a transaction between Mr. Kenny and
Messrs. Musgrave.

Mr. Walshe argued at some length that Limerick
labour should be utilised for the work, which the
local plumbers were fully competent to do.

Mr. W. Cullen and a deputation from the local
plumbers attended, and Mr. Cullen instanced the
work executed in Limerick by the city plumbers.

Communications expressing their readiness to
lay down the heating apparatus were received
from the local firms of T. F. McAuley, Prendergast
and Halpin, Thomas Hassett, and D. Thompson
and Sons.

The Chairman explained to the deputation that
the matter stood between the contractor and the
architect. The contractor, Messrs Kenny and
Sons, could give the contract, but subject to the
veto of the architect.

Rev. Father Murphy said that after what Mr.
Lynch stated the only thing that seemed to be
within the power of the Committee was to make a
recommendation to the contractor on the subject.

Mr. Lynch remarked that the Committee could
undoubtedly not interfere in the matter. All the
Committee could do was under the clause in the
contract providing that local labour should be
