DEATH OF MR. M. McNAMARA.

The body was found at the back of Craigeallaohie hill of Aviemore, and has been identified. An Edinburgh correspondent writes: The whole occurrence is wrapped in mystery. The Inverness police, who have the case in charge, there being only a village of Aviemore, are of opinion that there was foul play, and that Lady Marjory had been exposed, following an accident. It was the body that it is impossible to give the post mortem examination to give the cause of death, but a large sum of money was found in a pocket book, and her jewellery, some of which were of great value, was untouched. Foul play is out of the question. The body was lying deep in the heather, and in one of the inaccessible parts of a lonely region. She was last seen alive on the closing of the season. She was residing with her maid at King's Head, intended departing for the South on the 27th. Her ladyship was fond of mountain scenery, and as the heights near Aviemore contain the wildest scenes in the Grampians, she presumed that she had gone on a short excursion, taking one of the lesser known paths, and came by some accident. The police have an idea that her ankle is broken, and, as the path is a little traversed, she lay unable to overcome by the exposure. The weather was wild and stormy, and she has never long survived her desperate predicament, presuming her mistress had departed for the South, as pre-arranged, left King's Head, and the anxiety of the family at the disappearance ended with the tragic discovery on the side and the identification.

THE PADDOCKS ANNUAL SALE.
