William II. represents Daniel at the Cathedral of Metz. At the Academy of Sciences and Arts, in Berlin, he is a man Caesar, laureated. Again he adorns the post office at Strasbourg, and now he is to have a more than life-sized monument at Cologne. This will be an equestrian statue, in which his majestic will appear as a cuirassier, wearing the helmet with the Eagle of Prussia.

JUVENILE VOYAGERS LONG JOURNEY.

The White Star liner *Laurentic* landed at Liverpool from Canada on Saturday three Scandinavian children, who are on their way to their native country. It appears that the mother of the children died recently in America, and before embarking on the *Laurentic* at Quebec the youngsters had travelled a distance of 3,000 miles from a port on the Pacific coast, arrangements having been made by their friends with the White Star Line to take the juveniles home. From Liverpool they were conveyed by a White Star official to Newcastle-on-Tyne, whence they will sail to their native land, having reached which they will have covered a distance of over 6,000 miles.

FUNERAL OF MRS. A. HOLLIDAY.

Mrs. Anne Holliday, mother of our deservedly popular City High Sheriff, died on Sunday at the advanced age of 88 years, and the funeral of the deceased lady took place this morning, the interment being in the cemetery attached to St. Mary's Cathedral. It was the wish of the family that the obsequies should be private, but in deference to the feeling of a large number of friends in the city and district, they did not persevere in their intention, and accordingly there was a large attendance of the public at the funeral. Mrs. Holliday was born within a hundred yards of where she was laid to rest to-day, and for generations back her relatives were traders in the English town in the palmy days of Limerick's trade. The funeral left the residence of the deceased at ten o'clock, and at the Cathedral the Rev. T. B. Robertson, Rector of St. Munchin's, and Rev. T. F. Abbott, B.D., St. Mary's, officiated.
