The monthly meeting of the Glin School Board was held yesterday, Mr. P. Hayes, Chairman, presiding.

**INCREASE OF SALARY.**

Lady Emly moved her notice of motion to increase the salary of Miss Bourke, assistant laundress from £12 to £18. Her ladyship said this young girl, who was appointed ten years ago, had given every satisfaction.

Mr. Madden suggested that the Board be unanimous at £16 a year.

Several members protested against increasing salaries.
