DEATH OF MRS. STEPHEN O'MARA.

We record with very sincere regret the demise
of Mrs. O'Mara, wife of our highly esteemed
and popular fellow-citizen, Mr. Stephen O'Mara,
which took place yesterday morning at his resi-
dence, Strand House. The deceased lady had
been ailing for some two months past, and during
her illness was attended by her son, Father
O'Mara, S.J., Mungret College, Dr. Holmes, her
brother-in-law, Dr. Frank O'Mara, and her son-in-
law, Dr. O'Sullivan. Mrs. O'Mara was a lady
who was associated with social life in Limerick for
many years past, and in all charitable and philan-
thropic works she took a prominent part, her
generous heart and practical sympathy with the
poor and distressed being ever characteristic of
her. In private life her charm of manner, bright
and genial and ever-courteous disposition made
her highly popular with a wide circle of friends,
and her death has cast a gloom over the city which
she loved so well. In common with the public we
tender to her bereaved husband and family our
deep sympathy in their great sorrow.

The funeral will leave Strand House at ten
o'clock to-morrow (Friday) morning for the family
burial-place at Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.

Expert's Report.

Trenchant Criticism.

No more valuable or important doc-
ument has been presented to the Corporation for
than that of Mr. Aubrey V. Clayton,
submitted at the meeting of the Electric
Committee last night, on the resu-
lts of investigations recently conducted by him
concerning the working of the electric lighting concern
from the viewpoint of minuteness as
well as of cost and general research, the report of
which not only excelled, while the suggestions con-
tained therein if acted upon should serve in the
direction of working a transformation in this
municipal enterprise. Mr. Clayton's
report deals with causes which have conduced to the back-
wardness of things now existing at the power sta-
tion, and critically analyses every detail of the
accessories.

At last night's meeting the report, with
its highly technical character, was close-
ly examined by the Committee, but it was too much
so that it could be discussed until the morrow
was an opportunity of being supplied with
