SUDDEN DEATH OF A YOUNG CLARE GENTLEMAN.

A tragically sudden death is reported from the Ruah district, about six miles from Ennis. The two young Messrs. Kelly, sons of the late Mr. Jeremiah Kelly, J.P., Porte House, and stepsons of Mr. P. J. Mellett, J.P., were shooting on their lands, when the elder brother, who was a considerable distance away, noticing that his brother was not coming on, retraced his steps, and was horrified to find him lying in one of the fields quite dead. He had evidently had a sudden attack of illness, to which he was known to be subject. When the circumstances were placed before the coroner he did not think it necessary to hold an inquest. Widespread sympathy is felt with Mr. and Mrs. Mellett, who are so widely known and respected in the county.

CITY POLICE COURT.

Mr. E. F. Hickson, R.M., presided at the City Police Court yesterday. Private John Hannan was charged by Sergeant Doran with being a deserter from the 2nd Battalion Royal Irish Regiment. It was stated that the accused had overstayed his furlough. He was ordered to be handed over to the Military authorities. Mary Murray, an old offender, was charged with disorderly conduct in the streets. There were two charges of the kind against the accused, who was sentenced to two months' imprisonment, in default of paying £4 in fines.
