EXCHEQUER RECEIPTS.

The Exchequer returns issued on Tuesday night for the period from April 1st to February 18th, show that the receipts amounted to £172,251,107, an increase of £55,479,705 compared with the corresponding period of the previous year. The expenditure amounted to £144,276,735, an increase of £8,756,203. The amount of revenue received lut week was £6,666,399, compared with £3,562,000 in the corresponding period of the previous year.

THATCHER'S DEATH AT LISTOWEL.

Dr. J. Claney, Coroner for North Kerry, held an inquest at Listowel on the body of a thatcher named Michael Kennelly, Bedford, Listowel. From the evidence it would appear the deceased, who was about 68 years of age, was thatching a house for a farmer named Maurice Hayes, and, having climbed the ladder about half-way up, he suddenly, and without any apparent cause, was seen to fall to the ground, and when picked up was quite dead. Dr. J. G. Dillon gave evidence to the effect that the deceased died from heart failure, and a verdict was returned accordingly.
