## CITY PENSIONER'S DEATH.

### Inquest To-Day.

A sad state of domestic infelicity was unfolded in the evidence given at the inquest held in the Boardroom of the Limerick Workhouse this evening, into the circumstances attending the death of Isaac Rea, police pensioner, who died in the hospital of the institution on Sunday night.

Dr. M. R. Clery, J.P., Coroner, Hospital, conducted the investigation.

District Inspector White appeared for the Crown, and asked for a post mortem examination, as the widow of the deceased was in prison on a charge of assaulting her husband, who had since died. She would now be charged with murder.

Mr. J. H. Moran, solr., appeared for the accused.

The Coroner took the opinions of Doctors Graham, Nunan, and Brennan as to the necessity for a post mortem, and their view was that it would not throw any further light in aiding them in coming to a conclusion as to the cause of death.

District Inspector White notwithstanding the views of the doctors persisted in his application, and the Coroner asked for an expression of opinion from the jury, who, with the exception of the foreman, coincided with the view taken by the doctors.

Evidence was then given, the first witness examined being Thomas Rea, who deposed that he lived at 19 Edward street with his father and mother, his wife, and two lodgers. His father and mother frequently quarrelled, and on the 22nd inst while at his work a dispute occurred. When he returned home he found his father in bed. He was covered with blood, and asked his mother what happened to him when she admitted having struck him with a sweeping brush consequent on his calling her a terrible name. Witness informed the police, and Dr. Graham, on whose recommendation, he was removed to hospital.

Dr. Graham deposed to making a superficial examination of the deceased, on the invitation of the last witness. He had four wounds on the head, and some abrasions. He was then weak—his heart was weak, and had congestion of the lungs. The wounds were not the cause of death but accelerated it to some extent.

Drs. Nunan and Brennan attributed death to heart failure, accelerated by the injuries deceased had sustained.

The jury returned a verdict accordingly.
