## FUNERAL OF MR JOSEPH O'CONNOR

Yesterday the remains of the late Mr. Joseph O'Connor, Athlunkard street, were interred in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. At three o'clock the coffin was taken out from St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, where it had rested since Saturday night, and the cortege formed up. As was anticipated, the funeral was of very large dimensions, embracing every section of civic life, from his Worship the Mayor down to the most junior follower of Rugby football—a pastime in which the deceased held a prominent place in Ireland. It was a striking tribute to one who was justly held in high esteem in the city by every class without exception. All the Rugby Football Clubs were represented and not a few travelled a long distance to pay their final tribute of reverence to the memory of a good fellow and a true sportsman.
