have given notice of motion in the following terms-" In view of the fact that the French Chamber of Deputies and the British House of Commons have declared their willingness to accept a limitation of armaments, the Reichklag decides to request the Imperial Chancellor immediately to take steps to bring about an international understanding for a general limitation of armaments simultaneously with the abolition of the right of capture at sea." Tageblatt announces that the Radicals will also take the initiative. So that on the whole a generalpolicy for the limitation of armaments, which Great Britain will heartily join, may be brought about mooner than we expect. At all events let us hope so.

## THE LATE MR. GEORGE FURNELL.
