DUNRAVEN AND HOME RULE

Following St. Patrick's Day Message to his countrymen in America was sent by Lord Dunraven to the Associated Press and published in the United States:—
"I wish I could honestly say that to-morrow's day will rise on bright prospects for Ireland. But I do not think Home Rule will not, in my opinion, be extracted out of the wreck of the British Empire, and, if it were, it could not be a subject to a Socialist Single-Chamber Government at Westminster. Nor is the cause advanced by out-and-out alliance with the Radical Party. Such alliances breed violent results for Party purposes. Judging by their record, killing Land Purchase, I have little hope for a Home Rule Bill, satisfactory as to its source, to emanate from the Radical Party, and I think that Ireland should be cozened into
