## DEATH OF A CHRISTIAN BROTHER.

The death occurred at the Monastery, Sextonstreet on Tuesday, of Brother J. D. McNaily, a respected member of the Christian Brothers. The deceased was in his seventy-first year, and in the fifty-fifth year of his religious profession. He was a gentleman of considerable culture, and had done much for the youth of the city as a teacher. The interment took place to-day in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery in presence of a large body of mourners, including past and present students of the Christian Brothers' Schools.

#### INQUEST IN THE CITY.

Yesterday afternoon, Mr. James F. Barry, J.P. City Coroner, held an adjourned inquest at Clare. street, into the death of John Hayes, 54, a vanman, at Mesra. Carmody's bakery, Brunswick-street. The inquest was opened on Tuesday, but adjourned to yesterday with a view to a post mortem ex-amination being made. About ten or eleven weeks back the deceased sustained a fall which caused a fracture of the wrist and brused his hip. He was treated by Dr. Wm. O'Sullivan, and after some time resumed work, at which he continued up to Monday evening, when on returning home he complained of being ill, and died shortly afterwards. Head-Constable Walshe conducted the inquiry, and Mr. T. O'B. Kelly solicitor, appeard for the next-of-kin. The evidence of Michael Hayes, son of the deceased, was to the effect that his father complained of being ill, refused his dinner, but had a cup of tea. He got worse He got worse. and died before the arrival of the doctor and clergy man who were sent for. The deceased had complained of pain since he received the fall. Other evidence was given, and the jury decided on having a post mortem examination. This was accordingly made by Doctor O'Sullivan and Doctor Roberts, and at the adjourned inquest yesterlay they stated that death was due to sudden pardiac failure, the result of heart disease of some standing. In reply to Mr. Kelly, Dr. O'Sullivari was unable to say if death had been accelerated by the falt. The jury found in accordance with the medical testimony.
