MOTOR CAR ACCIDENT.

Charleville, Wednesday.

As Mr. T. Atwood, traveller of 37, Cransworth-street, Glasgow, was proceeding by motor from Cork to Dublin, with samples of motor accessories, for the Rotax Motor Accessories Company, of 43 and 45, Great Eastern-street, London, E.C., he met with an accident of a rather serious character between Buttevant and Charleville yesterday evening. While motoring down an incline at Castlewrix, over some broken stones, the axle of the front part gave way. One wheel dashed off, and the motor was dragged along for a considerable distance down the incline. The occupants were pitched out, the petrol valve got broken, and ignited by a spark from the axle, which was sent hopping along the broken stones.

DEATH OF A CHRISTIAN BROTHER.

The death occurred at the Monastery, Sexton-street, on Tuesday, of Brother J. D. McNally, a respected member of the Christian Brothers. The deceased was in his seventy-first year, and in the fifty-fifth year of his religious profession. He was a gentleman of considerable culture, and had done much for the youth of the city as a teacher. The interment took place to-day in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery in presence of a large body of mourners, including past and present students of the Christian Brothers' Schools.

INQUEST IN THE CITY.

Yesterday afternoon, Mr. James F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, held an adjourned inquest at Clare-street, into the death of John Hayes, 54, a vanman, at Messrs. Carmody's bakery, Brunswick-street. The inquest was opened on Tuesday, but adjourned to yesterday with a view to a post mortem examination being made. About ten or eleven weeks back the deceased sustained a fall which caused a fracture of the wrist and bruised his hip. He was treated by Dr. Wm. O'Sullivan, and after some time resumed work, at which he continued up to Monday evening, when on returning home he complained of being ill, and died shortly afterwards. Head-Constable Walsho conducted the inquiry, and Mr. T. O'B. Kelly, solicitor, appeared for the next-of-kin. The evidence of Michael Hayes, son of the deceased, was to the effect that his father complained of being ill, refused his dinner, but had a cup of tea. He got worse, and died before the arrival of the doctor and clergyman who were sent for. The deceased had complained of pain since he received the fall. Other evidence was given, and the jury decided on having a post mortem examination. This was accordingly made by Doctor O'Sullivan and
