DEATH OF THE REV. S. L. GOGGIN, B.A.

We record this evening with very sincere regret the death of a young Limerick gentleman, the Rev. Stephen L. Goggin, B.A., Curate in Charge of Ballycotton, Diocese of Cloyne, who passed away on Saturday night at his residence, the Parsonage, after a few days illness, the result of an attack of pneumonia. The sad and most unexpected news came as a great shock to his many friends in Limerick, most of whom were not even aware that he was ill, and the cutting off of a young life full of promise—the passing away of one who by his manly, frank, and genial manner made him a great favourite with all who knew him—is deeply mourned in Limerick as well as, of course, in those centres where his ministerial career was spent, and where he enjoyed the respect and esteem of all classes and orders. Mr. Goggin, who was the only son of the late Mr. Stephen Byron Goggin, a member of an old Limerick family, was but in his 26th year. He had a brilliant collegiate course in Trinity College, where in connection with his B.A. degree he obtained honours in Ethics and Logic. An earnest and zealous student, he at the same time, while in College, availed himself of manly pastimes, notably rowing, and he was one of a junior D.U.B.C. crew which carried the club colours to victory in a £100 cup event. Mr. Goggin was ordained in 1904 for the Curacy of Kinsale, and in June, 1906, was appointed Curate in charge of Ballycotton and Kilmahon. Here, as in Kinsale, he was a great favourite with all classes of the community. He was Hon. Secretary of the local Life Boat Society, and was one of those who were instrumental in obtaining a Government grant for the renovation or improvement of the building, and in many other respects he showed his interest in every movement for the well-being of the locality. He married a daughter of the Rev. Dr. Pearson, LL.D., Rector of Kinsale, and the deepest sympathy is expressed with his widow, her little daughter, and with his relatives in Limerick and elsewhere in their poignant grief. The remains are to arrive in Limerick this evening from Cork at 7.40, when they will be removed to St. John's Church. Funeral will take place to-morrow at 10 o'clock, the interment being in the family vault at St. John's.
