

## FUNERAL OF MRS. LANCELOT BAYLY

### BAYLY FARM, NENAGH.

The remains of this much-loved lady, whose death occurred rather unexpectedly on Sunday, 2nd inst., at Droedan, where she had been sojourning with her husband for some months past, were laid to rest yesterday in the picturesque churchyard at Ballinacloyne, near Nenagh. Mrs. Bayly, who was married but four years ago to Mr. Lancelot Bayly, a member of an old and very popular family in the North Riding of Tipperary, was a daughter of Major Drake, of Clifton, Bristol, and a sister to Mrs. Robert Twiss, of Birdhill. Although she had lived for but a short time in this country she had endeared herself to all those who knew her, and the grief felt at her death at an early age was attested by the great number of persons of all classes who were present at her interment.

Dean Humphreys and Canon Thomas officiated at the Burial Service in Ballinacloyne Church and at the graveside.

## FUNERAL OF THE LATE REV. S. L. GOGGIN, B.A.

The funeral of the late Rev. Stephen L. Goggin, B.A. (only son of the late Mr. S. B. Goggin, of this city), curate in charge of Ballycotton, whose very sudden death, the result of an attack of pneumonia, at the early age of 29 years, we recorded in our last issue, took place on Tuesday morning from the Passage en route to Limerick. The rev. gentleman's death has cast a gloom over the village of Ballycotton, where he was beloved by all classes and creeds, as evidenced by the general mourning in the shops and private houses, and the very large concourse of the town's people who assembled to pay a last mark of respect to the departed young clergyman and sympathy with his bereaved widow and relatives. The bells of the Protestant and Roman Catholic Churches tolled as the funeral was passing on its way to Middleton Station. A short service was held in Ballycotton Church, the Dean of Clonme, the Rev. J. H. MacConnell M.A., Rector of Desertberges, and Rev. A. W. Brew, B.A., Rector of Aghada, officiating. The remains arrived in Limerick at 7.40 p.m., and were met by a large number of mourners, including many young friends of the deceased, who bore the massive oak coffin from the station to the hearse in waiting. There were no flowers by request. The cortege then proceeded to St. John's Church, where the remains were deposited overnight, and after the service yesterday morning, at ten o'clock, the interment took place in the family vault at St. John's. The officiating clergy were—The Rev. Chancellor Hackett, and the Rev. C. V. C. Atkinson. The hymns selected were—"Now the Laborer's Task is O'er," and "Jesus, Lover of My Soul." The first part of the service was read by the Rev. Mr. Atkinson, and the second by the Chancellor. As the coffin was being borne out of the church, the Dead March in *Soul* was played on the organ.

## CITY HOUSING SCHEME.

### LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD INQUIRY.

To-day, Mr. J. F. Macabe, Local Government Board Inspector, held an inquiry in the Town Hall into the application of the Corporation for a loan of £10,515 for the purpose of built workingmen's dwellings in the city.

Mr. John Dundin, solicitor, appeared for applicants; Mr. T. H. Kenny, solicitor, appeared for Dr. Cook, a landlord of property proposed to be acquired under the scheme, and Mr. P. O'Donnell, solicitor, for Mr. Collins, a tenant of Dr. Cook.

Among those present during the proceedings were—The Mayor (Councillor T. Ryan), Alder P. O'Donovan, Mr. M. O'Callaghan, B.C., Mr. Molloy, Secretary to the Town Tenants, and T. Lawlor, Assistant Secretary to the same body.

The first witness examined was Mr. E. O'Toole, City Treasurer, who in reply to Mr. Dundin stated the valuation of the city was £74,325. Total outstanding loans, £81,625 0s. 3d., with added to Corporation stock, was £91,924 0s. The margin of borrowing powers was £77,813 3d. The annual rent £1,406 11s.

In reply to the Inspector, the witness shilling in the pound on buildings would produce £3,474 14s. 3d., and the same figure on land is 8d. The rate for the current year was 11s in the £. For 1907 it was 11s. 6d.; for 1908, 11s. 6d.; and 1910, 11s. 4d.

Evidence touching the number of houses already erected by the Corporation for the various classes in the city was then given. For three years ended the 31st. March of this year receipts and expenditure in connection with houses were £1,251 4s. 9d. and £1,318 14s. or a loss of £67 9s. 7d.

Mr. W. M. Nolan, J.P., Town Clerk, was called, and submitted the minutes of the Improvement Scheme Committee and the Borough Council applying for the loan in question.

Mr. J. J. Peacocke, City Surveyor, was examined, and placed the plans of the proposed houses before the enquiry. He said the number of houses for which provision was made in the scheme was seventy-two. He proposed to build seven in Garryowen, thirteen in the site corner of the Markets, and forty-two at Rincorra. There would be three four or five-room dwellings, and the rents proposed to be charged without incurring any loss, were 3s., 3s. 6d. 4s. per week respectively.

Mr. O'Donnell said he did not object to the scheme as a whole, but to the site proposed to be acquired from his client. If that was acquired it would deprive him of a right of way.

Mr. Peacocke said that could be obviated by allowing him a separate passage. It was suggested that the laborers that were required there should be town labourers.

Mr. Kenny, on behalf of the landlord, objected to the scheme as a whole, but object being deprived of the inner portion of the property for the purpose among other things of putting out repairs to the other houses built there.

Mr. Peacocke pointed out that he did not propose absorbing the entire entrance to the property.

Mr. O'Donnell said he should not be consenting to any compromise. When the matter came down the landlord would get the oyster and the tenant the shell.

The Inspector—These are the sites proposed to be acquired by agreement.

Mr. Dundin—Yes.

Mr. Patrick Molloy, Secretary to the Tenants' League, was then sworn. He said the League had taken a very active part in relation to these proceedings since the passing of the Act of 1903 and before it. Practically all the information as regarded the sanitary condition of the houses inhabited by the workers in the city was supplied by the League, as well as the number of houses and the state of congested conditions under which this class lived in the city could not possibly be worse, and it would be difficult to find a parallel for them in any part of the country. The fact was, it was difficult to understand a man living in one of these houses could
