HUSBAND AND WIFE CHARGED.

Yesterday evening Sergeant Doran arrested a woman named Mary Cosgreave on a charge of being in illegal possession of a sum of money, the property of a vanman named Michael Fahy. On the third of this month the money was lost by Fahy, who informed the police, and from information that came to Sergeant Doran he took Cosgreave into custody. She was brought before Mr. A. J. Eakins, J.P., subsequently, and remanded. On the way to the goal she made a statement to the police, and as a result her husband, Christopher Cosgreave, was placed under arrest. Both were brought before Mr. E. F. Hickson, R.M., at the City Police Court this morning when the woman was discharged and the man remanded to Petty Sessions.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH.
