## ALLEGED STAMP FRAUD.

Petty Sessions yesterday, before Mr. Justice, in the chair; Dr. Moloney, Mr. James McMahon, and Mr. O'Brien was charged, at the prosecution of Mr. Franks, Officer of Inland Revenue, 19th February, 1911, at Cappamore, for the purpose of using a stamp which had been removed from another instrument with intent of using same again; and for using an instrument, that is to say a letter, used to a party in Manchester having an adhesive stamp which had been removed to his knowledge, from an instrument with intent to use same again.

(S. Gaffney, Crown Solicitor, Limerick, was undefended, but attended accompanied by his mother.

On the charge of dishonesty, Postmistress at Cappamore, receipt of the letter, and in consequence of instructions brought the letter to the attention of the defendant and required from him to return the defendant admitted posting it, and also required the Postmistress admitting his guilt by begging forgiveness, and promising that the offence would never occur again.
