FUNERAL OF MR. J. D. FITZGERALD.

An old and respected citizen has passed away at the ripe age of 76 years in the person of Mr. John Desmond Fitzgerald, Tritonville, Military Road, Limerick. He was for over forty years chief engineer and draughtsman of Messrs. J. N. Russell and Sons, and retired some few years ago. His demise has been heard of with much regret by very many friends, who deeply sympathise with his family in their sorrow.

A striking testimony to the esteem in which the deceased was held, was the large number of people who joined the mourners as the remains were being conveyed to St. Michael's R.C. Church, where they rested overnight. Requiem Mass was celebrated on Thursday morning at 8.30, a large congregation being present. The celebrant was Fr. Hannan, O.C., St. Michael's. The funeral took place at 2 o'clock to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery.
