## SAD CITY FATALITY.

## Child Rolled Over.

A sad accident, resulting in the death of the little victin, took place in Clare Street on Saturday evening. Some time after two o'clock a boy named Patrick Hayes was on the road when he was rolled over by an empty oil cart, the property of a man named Madden, who did everything possible to avert the socident. The child was taken to the house of his parents at St. Lelia Street, where he smoonmbed to his injuries yesterday morning.

At noon Mr. J. F. Barry, J.P., City Coroner, and a jury held an inquest on the remains.

Sergeant Soales, Mary street, conducted the investigation, and Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, solr... represented Mr. P. Madden, the driver of the horre and car, which knocked down the deceased

Denis Hayes, father of the deceased, deposed that he lived at No. 6, St. Lelia street. He identified the boy, whose age, he said, was six

Stephen Murphy was next examined, and stated that at about two o'clock on Saturday he driving in Clare street with a load of bags. saw the child Hayes, who got on to the end of his car. Witness turned him off, He then looked round. and passed on. and saw the child being rolled over by the wheel of Madden's car. Witness shouted to the driver who did his best to pull up. He got down off the car and brought the child into a house. The cart was at the proper side of the road, and the horse was trotting at the rate of five miles an hour. At the time of the accident Madden's horse was about a hundred yards past witness. no other vehicle on the road.

Patrick Madden offered himself for examination, but his evidence was not deemed necessary.

Dr. Roberts attributed death to shock conse-

quent on the injuries received, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.
