Mr. Andrew Carnegie, in replying to an invitation to address the members of the City Liberal Club on the Arbitration Treaty, regrets his inability to comply, as he is residing in Scotland, after his busy campaign in America, and adds: "You will be pleased to learn that it is quite true that Germany has asked to be embraced in the list of those making a Treaty of Arbitration settling all disputes, and that our State Department is to day negotiating with four Powers—the first, of course, this land. I never was so optimistic in my life, and I always have been optimistic. I believe we are on the eve of the abolition of war among civilised nations."
