MR. CARNEGIE AND THE WORLD'S PEACE.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie, in replying to an invitation to address the members of the City Liberal Club on the Arbitration Treaty, regrets his inability to comply, as he is residing in Scotland, after his busy campaign in America, and adds: "You will be pleased to learn that it is quite true that Germany has asked to be embraced in the list of those making a Treaty of Arbitration settling all disputes, and that our State Department is to-day negotiating with four Powers—the first, of course, this land. I never was so optimistic in my life, and I always have been optimistic. I believe we are on the eve of the abolition of war among civilised nations."

DEATH OF MR. HENRY CHRISTIE.

We regret to record the unexpected demise of Mr. Henry Christie, law clerk, which took place yesterday at Barrington's Hospital. Mr. Christie was out and about so late as Saturday evening last, but for a considerable time past had been in failing health. His demise at the age of 66 years removes a familiar figure from our midst. For nearly half a century Mr. Christie has been connected with legal business in this city. A large portion of his earlier career was spent in the office of the late Mr. Michael Sellors, solr., and for the past twenty years he occupied the position of managing clerk to Mr. Benjamin Barrington, Solicitor, George street, and he ever displayed keen ability, acumen, and judgment combined with invariable courtesy in the discharge of his duties. Mr. Christie was a most interesting raconteur so far as Limerick people of a past and gone generation were concerned, and there was very little of the history of the old city for the past fifty years that he had not so to speak at his finger's ends. His demise is sincerely regretted by many friends in the city and elsewhere. Funeral private at Castletown, Pallaskeyry.
