THE LATE MRS. LAVERTINE.

We recorded in our last issue the death of Mrs. John Lavertine, of Stenbrook, Castleconnell, and 65, George-street, Limerick. The lamented lady was born at Kandy, Ceylon, and was the daughter of the late John James Dwyer, Captain in the Ceylon Rifle Regiment, and grand-daughter of James Dwyer, Senior Surgeon, 5th Foot. Of Mrs. Lavertine's eleven sons there are only four surviving. The eldest of these gentlemen has spent nearly all his life as Mining Engineer in South Africa. He served with his elder brother in the first Boer War, and also in the Jameson Raid, and in the last British Campaign in that country. Dr. Joseph Christopher Lavertine, the second son, has passed most of his life in India, from which country he was sent by the Indian Government to South Africa, where he was put in charge of No. 1 ambulance train, which was commonly known as "Lavertine's train," and in addition to the two Service medals he received many clasps. Another son made a trip to the Transvaal to see the works of his deceased brother Mr. Richard A. Lavertine who was Government Surveyor in the Transvaal for some years after the first Boer War in 1881, and subsequently Consulting Engineer to one of the principal Financial and Mining concerns in that country. The youngest son Mr. A. X. Lavertine is a Fleet Surgeon in the Royal Navy. The sphere of work of these gentlemen was cast widely apart, and it was therefore consoling to them to have been nearly all together at the last moments of their esteemed, and much respected mother, whose demise is deeply regretted by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance.

The funeral took place to-day from the Railway Station to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery on the arrival of the 1.17 train from Castleconnell.

The chief mourners were:—Messrs. John Lavertine (husband); Alphonsus, Joseph, Frederick and Albert Lavertine (sons); also Miss Lavertine, and Mrs. A. X. Lavertine (daughter-in-law).
