DEATH OF THE REV. M. E. O'MALLEY

We regret to record the death of the Rev. M. E. O'Malley, Rector of Kiltinanlea, Clonlara, which occurred on Saturday at 1 Alexandra Terrace. The rev. gentleman, who had reached the ripe age of 80 years, had been in failing health for some months past. Ordained in 1870, the earlier portion of his ministerial career was spent in the North of Ireland and in the County Wicklow, and for the long period of 31 years he had been Rector of Clonlara, in the Diocese of Killaloe. He was an old member of the Diocesan Council, and also one of the Diocesan Treasurers, which position he resigned recently owing to ill-health, together with the Rural Deanery. He was a most charitable and kind-hearted gentleman, and was held in the highest esteem and regard by all classes and creeds in the district. With his brother clergy he was extremely popular, and throughout the Diocese the passing away of a familiar personality is sincerely mourned.

The remains of the deceased gentleman were removed from Alexandra Terrace at 11 o'clock this morning for interment in Clonlara Cemetery. Amongst those who formed the cortege were:—The Rev. J. T. FUNERAL OF THE LATE HYDE.
