DEATH OF A BANK OFFICIAL.

Our Glin correspondent writes :- A painful shock was caused in Glin on Friday evening on receipt of the news that Mr. Cornelius Boohan, Accountant in the Tarbert Branch Office of the Munster and Leinster Bank, had passed away quite unexpectedly the previous day. Deceased had not been feeling well latterly, but no one anticipated that the promising career of this capable and courteous official would be thus cut short. The late Mr. Boohan, who was esteemed and respected by his confrerent of the Bank and by its customers, was a general favourite, and deep sympathy is expressed with his relatives, and Mr. Grainger and his staff, in their loss. A large cortege, composed of relatives and the people of Tarbert district and of Glin accompanied the remains on Saturday to deceased's native place, Kilmeedy, County Limerick, where the interment took place.

FIRE AT HOSPITAL.

A few evenings since a rick of hay, the property of Mr. James Davern, Hospital, was discovered to be on fire. Fortunately, some barrels of water were at hand, which on being poured on, extinguished the flames. On investigation it was found that some person had entered the stables of Mr. T. F. Slattery and placed in an opening in the wall—outside which was the hay—a canvas bag which was packed with paper, the whole being saturated with oil, which on being ignited, the fire extended to the hay. Were it not that a little girl in the employment of Mr. Owen Shanahan, coachbuilder, observed the burning in its earliest stages, it is feared that the whole eastern side of the town, including the premises of Mr. Slattery, Mr. Davern, and Mr. Shanshan would have become affected, and probably destroyed.
