

THE LATE MR. JOHN BOYD.

THE FUNERAL.

The funeral of the late lamented Mr. John Boyd, Secretary of the Limerick Harbour Board and Chamber of Commerce, took place yesterday morning at ten o'clock from his residence, Rose Hill, for interment at St. Mary's Cathedral. The cortege, which was of very large dimensions, was fully representative of all classes and creeds in the city. Every interest was represented, the legal and medical professions, the heads of industrial concerns and mercantile enterprise, representatives of the Corporation, and members of the Chamber of Commerce, Harbour and Poor Law Boards, as well as a large body of the general public. All along the route business houses were shuttered or had blinds drawn while the mournful procession passed, and the flags of the shipping in port, the Harbour office, the Limerick Boat Club, Shannon Rowing Club, and Lansdowne Factory, were at half mast. The massive oak coffin in which the remains were enclosed, was strewn with beautiful wreaths of natural flowers.

THE IRISH RAILWAY STRIKES.

EFFORTS TO OPEN NEGOTIATIONS

Threat to Call Out Transport Workers.

Employes Returning to Work

Dublin, Monday.

Efforts are being made, says the Press Association correspondent, to re-open the negotiations between the Irish railway companies and the men to-day. Mr. Hudson, M.P. who is in Dublin acting for Mr. Williams, general secretary of the A.S.R.S., has written to all the companies asking them to receive deputations of their own employes now on strike, to discuss the question of reinstatement. The men declare that telegrams continue to arrive from their colleagues, urging them to stand firm.

Dublin, Monday night

The Press Association special correspondent Dublin, telegraphing late to-night says:—The companies have not replied to the men's proposals. The men have decided that unless they get a satisfactory answer by noon to-morrow they will call out all transport workers.

MEETING OF THE "LOCO" MEN.

Their Decision.

A crowded meeting of the locomotive engine and firemen was held on Sunday night in the Workmen's Club, Inchicore, to consider the offer of Sir William Goulding contained in a letter, a copy of which was published in our issue on Saturday. The speakers included—W. Hudson, M.P.; N. Rimmer, organiser; C. T. Crahan, Executive Committee; A. Law, Executive Committee, and W. P. Partridge. The following resolution was carried unanimously:—

"That this meeting of men employed upon the Great Southern and Western Railway realize that in the loyalty of each is the salvation of the other, and pledge themselves not to return to work until every man is reinstated in his former position without penalty, and urge upon all railwaymen to stand by their fellows until this result is attained."
