### SUIT AGAINST TYPOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY.

At the Limerick Quarter Sessions on Saturday afternoon, before his Honor County Court Judge Law Smith, K.C.,

Joseph McNamara, Richmond-street, Limerick, sued the Limerick Typographical Society for £21 10s., being the amount of out-of-work allowance payable by the defendants to plaintiff. The claim was made up as follows—Three quarters in 1909, four quarters in 1910, and two quarters in 1911

Mr. Kelly, B.L., appeared for plaintiff, and Mr. O'Donnell, solr., for defendants.

The plaintiff's evidence went to show that as he

was a member of the Typographical Society he was entitled to £21, but he was not exactly certain about 5s. or 10s. for out-of-work allowance. He went to Dublin in April, 1909, and was a member of the Society there, and returned to Limerick last March; he was entitled to the above mentioned claim of £21 10s. In April, 1909, he made a claim for 10s., but there was some objection about the matter, and he returned it to the local

To Mr. O'Donnell, solr.—He came to Limerick

on 14th March last.

Mr J Christy, Secretary of the Limerick Branch of the Society, deposed that since Mr McNamara left Limerick to go to Dublin he was in arrears with the Limerick branch. On the 26th April, 1909, the plaintiff made a claim for an allowance of 10s a week, which was passed by the local Committee, but the Executive Council stopped the payment, and Mr. MeNamara returned the 10s again. There was no more paid to the plaintiff since. The society to which witness belonged had no control over the men belonging to the Dublin society, because the Dublin society was an independent one.

To His Honor-Any man could become a member of the society who spent seven years at

the printing business.

Continuing, witness said that the plaintiff was not entitled to any benefit from the Limerick branch, as he was in arrears with them. Of course if he went to any other place, Drogheda for instance, he would get a benefit allowance, but when he was a member of the Dublin Branch he was not entitled to an allowance from any other branch but Dublin; because as he (witness) had already said, Dublin Branch was an independent Plaintiff got into arrears on December 25th, 1909, and from that time until June, 1911, he did not pay his weekly subscription to the local ociety. The witness then read some rules of the society to strengthen his evidence.

Cross examined by Mr. Kelly, B.L.—The local branch paid an allowance of 10s., but the Council in Munchester overruled it. He (witness) offered £3 from himself to plaintiff not to bring the case

before the Court.

Mr. E. Hayes, Treasurer of the Dublin Typographical Society, deposed that the Dublin Branch had nothing to de with other branches, as it was an independent society in itself. The
