A few ars ago some Irish curers put forward a request r the institution of a Government brand for ish pickled mackerel, but there was a difference opinion as to whether the additional cost it ould involve would be more than met by thanced returns. Be that as it may, the fall in ice, the report informs us, has continued, and ie Department is taking steps itself to improve atters. They have made arrangements to have ackerel cured at Courtmacsherry (an experiental station), under the superintendence of an opert Norwegian curer, and to have the fish assified and packed according to the grades hich find favour in the American markets. An ish Crown brand has been established for cured errings, such as has been in existence in cotland for a century, and it is anticipated that will have a beneficial effect, and a remunerative sult, but the report points out that this will pend on curers, " not only in putting up fish a quality and cure sufficient to meet the various rades of the brand, but over, rather than under, ie standards that are named and passed by titled officials." The Department have also intinued their endeavours to develop the sale of sh in inland towns, a step which should meet ith the practical appreciation and support of ie public. The railway companies have agree ! reduce rates and freights, and all thing; msidered, the inland trade should very conderably develop in the future, more especially the Department believe that their efforts have cured "a better and more continuous supply ian heretofore."
