tural labourer, on the 16th ult.

District Inspector Craig prosecuted, and Mr.
H. O'B. Moran, solicitor, appeared for the
accused.

The depositions having been completed, the
prisoner was returned for trial to the Assizes.

FATALITY NEAR CROOM.

A two-and-a-half year old child of Mr. Edward
McElroy, Graigcurra, Granagh, succumbed on
Tuesday in Croom Workhouse Hospital to burns
sustained at its parents' house. It appears that
during the temporary absence of the father and
mother the child used a bellows on the fire
causing a flame which caught on the deceased's
clothing. An alarm having been raised, the father
was promptly on the scene, and, in endeavouring
to save the child, got rather badly burnt himself.

An inquest was held on the remains yesterday
by Mr. Coroner Clery, and a verdict of accidental
death was returned, the jury conveying their
sympathy to the parents of the ill-fated child.
