DEATH OF CAPTAIN THOMAS WESTROPP-BENNETT.

We regret to record the death of a very popular County Limerick gentleman, Captain Thomas Westropp-Bennett, late 39th Regiment, which took place on Tuesday last at his residence, Ballymurphy, in his 78th year. The deceased gentleman, who came from an old county family. was son of the late Rev. James Bernett, of Fedamore. Chosing the Army as a profession he served through the Crimean war, and being stricken down with cholera was for some time invalided at the hespital at Scutari, but on becoming convalescent again joined the campaign, the terrible rigors of which he naturally experienced. He also served at Gibraltar, Mauritius, Quebec. and Bermuda Islands, and was the possessor of the British, Sardinian, and Turkish medals, for distinguished service in the field. In home life, Mr. Bennett by his kindly and genial disposition had the good will and high esteem of all classes and creeds, who deeply regret the passing away of one who took a deep interest in his native county, and who in his earlier days was an enthusiastic and ardent sportsman. He rode many a mount to victory on the old Newcastle Race Course, and he was one of the oldest members of the County Limerick Hunt.

The funeral takes place at one o'clock to-morrow (Friday) from Ballymurphy for Crecora, the family burial place.
