St. George, R.M., at which Martin Quilty and Michael Dennehy were charged separately with the murder of Daniel Downes, Sergeant Jones deposed that about 9.50 p.m. Sunday he proceeded to Ballydaheen. On the enue leading to Martin Quilty's house he found e body of Daniel Downes. His mother-in-law, len Gubbins, was with him. He was lying on e back, dead. Deponent proceeded to the use of Quilty, arrested him, charged him with e murder of Daniel Downes, and gave him the usual caution, and he made the following state- ent—"I fired at him in my own defence. When aw him in my yard at the gate I said, 'Downes, hat brought you here, you scoundrel,' or words hat effect. Downes said, 'I will do for you.' there is a shot above his boots I am guilty of a murder. You all know who he is." Accused id that was correct.
