AMERICAN TRAIN SMASH.

Many Killed.

Express in Collision.

St. Paul (Minnesota), Monday.

A disastrous train wreck occurred this morning near Odessa, Minnesota. A second section of the Trans-continental express on the Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Paul Railroad crashed into the first section, which had been stopped by signal, and nine persons were killed and a large number of others seriously injured.—Reuter.

BURNING FATALITY AT ADARE.

An old-age pensioner named Mary Malone, aged 80 years, who lived alone, was found on Saturday morning by a Miss Morrissey, who was in the habit of calling to see the old lady, burned to death, lying across a chair in her little home at Adare. It is assumed that the poor woman was about retiring to bed when the bed must have accidentally caught fire, and being feeble and infirm was unable to save herself. An inquest was held, and a verdict of accidental death was returned.
