**AN OPEN BOAT.**

**Larry Lauder's Exciting Experience.**

Larry Lauder had an exciting experience in an open boat in the Clyde on Sunday, which might have resulted disastrously. Leaving Manchester Saturday midnight for Lauderdale House near Glasgow, there to visit a son who is ill, Mr. Lauder engaged two fishermen to row him across the Clyde from Gourrock on Sunday morning. A gale was blowing, and the first attempt to cross was abandoned. A second attempt was successful after a severe buffeting, lasting nearly three hours. The boat shipped heavy seas, the men were drenched, and but for the fishermen's skillful handling of the craft, would certainly have been swamped. Mrs. Lauder and her son, from Lauderdale House, watched the crossing and landing near Dunoon Castle. The comedian, little Larry, who has had a similar experience, said it was so terrible that he would not undergo it again for the money he had or would earn.

**CHRISTMAS AT SANDRINGHAM.**

Queen Alexandra, Princess Victoria, the Prince of Wales, Prince Albert, Princess Mary, Prince George, and Prince George attended divine service at Sandringham Church on Christmas morning in bright weather, though earlier the conditions had been dull and wet. The church was tastefully decorated. Rev. Canon Dalton, Domestic Chaplain to the King, and Deputy Clerk of the Closet, officiated. Christmas hymns were sung. The Prince of Wales saw Queen Alexandra and Princess Victoria to their carriage, and the Royal party drove back to Sandringham House. The Prince of Wales, with his brothers and sister, walked across Sandringham Park to York Cottage, accompanied by Mr. Mansell, the Prince's tutor.

The latter continued the search throughout the night, and the sad discovery was made at ten o'clock on Sunday morning. Great sympathy is felt with Dr. Evans.

**DEATH OF MR. MICHAEL O'SHAUGHNESSY, BALLYHAHILL.**

Our Glin correspondent writes:—The news of the death of Mr. Michael O'Shaughnessy, of Ballyhahill caused a painful shock to numbers of people outside his native parish, by whom he was held in the very highest esteem, his neighbours, aware that his health was anything but robust latterly, were in a measure prepared for the sad event which has out of, in the prime of life, a man held in the highest esteem in the surrounding districts. As Chairman of the Rathkeale Board of Guardians, a member of the Glin School Board, and Manager of the local Co-Operative Creamery he gave proofs of his high rectitude and ability. To his bereaved wife and children the sympathies of all go out in their great affliction. The funeral cortege to Knockpatrick Churchyard was of an imposing character, magistrates, representative men, and the people of West Limerick generally being present.

**PARLIAMENT'S BUSY POST OFFICE**

No fewer than 910,000 letters have been posted at the House of Commons, and 1,140,000 received during the year. In addition to 17,303 registered letters and 2,856 express letters, 3,431 parcels were despatched, and 27,388 ordinary telegrams were sent out, and 21,934 were delivered, while the number of Press telegrams sent was 46,690, and delivered 1,121.
