We regret to have to announce the death of Mr. Patrick Fitzg rald, Greenhills, the melan-choly event taking place to-day at St. John's Hospital, from an acute attack of poeumonia, and after a comparatively brief illness. The deceased was a very popular member of the community, and a general favourite with all classes, his kindly, genial, manner winning him many friends. LABOURER SHOT AT KILLONAN.

The constabulary brought to Barrington's early this morning, a labourer named James Sheehan, of Killonan, who was fired at and shot in the neck and face about 2 a. n. today. A number of grains of shot were extracted from Sheehan's neck, and in connection with the occurrence Corpelius McGrath, Killonar, was placed under arrest by the police. McGrath, it is stated, was in charge of the premises of Mr. John McCormack, a farmer, residing in Killonan district, who had gone to Monuleen to attend some social reunion, and hearing a noise about the premises, he got a gun which, it seems, was loaded with a charge of No. 8 shot. Sheehan entered the house, and McGrath discharged the weapon with, he states, the intention of frightening him off rather than of wounding him. Happily the injuries inflicted were not as serious in the circumstances as they might have been. Sheehan, for some reason, is said to have mistaken Mr. McCormack's house for the one where he was employed, and this partly accounts for the occurrence of the shooting. The accused was brought before Mr. P. J. Kelly, R. M., this evening at William Street Police Barracks and remanded. Bail was measured in £100 and two sureties of £50 each.
