NATIONAL INSURANCE ACT. 1911.

Limerick County Council.

The following has been issued:—"For the purpose of bringing the greatest possible benefits under the above Act within the reach of all employed persons in this County, and who are not members of "approved Societies," the Limerick County Council have by resolution dated 20th January, 1911, decided to take the necessary steps for the formation of a County Society.

"Under the provisions of the Act it is compulsory on nearly all employed persons of both sexes to become insured whose age is between 16 years and 65 years, and who have not an income of more than £150 per annum.

"As the funds of the County Society" will be locally administered, under local control the advantages of being a member instead of a Post Office contributor are obvious.

"Application forms for membership may be obtained from any County Councillor or directly from John J. Quaid, 82 and 83 O'Connell street, Limerick.

"N.B.—It is desirable that applications be sent in immediately."

It may be pointed out in connection with the above scheme that it possesses many advantages, amongst them being the fact that the claims for sickness in the rural districts will be very small compared with large industrial centres, so that at the end of three years, when a valuation is being made, there will be additional funds for the benefit of the members, either by reducing their contributions or increasing their benefits in proportion. Full information regarding the County Limerick Society may be had from Mr. Quaid, and it will be observed that the County Council has lost no time in taking the necessary steps to form it.

CHILD SERIOUSLY BURNED.

Fatal Result.

A little girl named Bridget Long, aged five, from Walshe's Lane, was admitted to Barrington's Hospital on Thursday, suffering from burns on her arms, neck and body.
