He had been in failing health for some time past, and his death, which occurred at the age of 69, has been heard of with sincere regret by many old friends in Limerick, where the greater portion of an active life was spent.

SIR HEFFERNAN CONSIDINE.

County Limerick people will learn with much regret of the death of Sir Heffernan Considine, late Assistant Inspector-General, Royal Irish Constabulary, which occurred yesterday at his residence, Farmhill, Roebuck, Dundrum, after a painfully short illifess.

Sir Heffernan Considine, who was eldest son of thellate Mr. Heffernan Considine, D. L. of De k, Co Limerick, was born in 1846. He was educated at Stoneyhurst and Lincoln College, Oxford, in which he graduated B.A. He was High Sheriff of the County Limerick in 1881, and was appointed a Resident Magistrate in 1882, serving in Cork and Kerry during a troublous period in Irish history. In 1887 he was transferred to Kilkenny, and served there and in other counties until 1900. Hereceived the thanks of the Lord Lieutenaut and the Irish Government for his valuable services on six occasions. He was made a C.B. in 1902, a Member of the Victorian Order in 1906, and in 1908 the honour of Knighthood was conferred upon him. In 1900 he was appointed Assistant-Inspector-General of the Royal Irish Constabulary.

MISS GERTRUDE BACON.

First Lady Aviator.

The Lecture to be delivered next Friday even ing on "Flying Machines, Balloons and Airships" by Miss Gertrude Bacon, at the Atheneum, promises to be an exceptionally attractive one. Miss Bacon is the daughter of the late Rev. J. M. Bacon, the celebrated aronaut and lecturer; and is herself an regial traveller of unique experience. having made many vo ages by ballaon airship accoplane, several of a highly exciting description. accompanied her father as chief assistant on many of his most note-worthy scientific ascents, including one specially perilous occasion when the balloon, which had ascended at night, was lost above the clouds for ten hours, thus establishing a record in English aeron autics-a very rough descent in Wales being subsequently experienced in which Miss Bscon sustained a broken arm. She was the first woman to venture in an aeroplane. She may be considered an expert in aviation, having made a study of the subject, and having flown both in biplane and monoplane. She is a vivacious speaker, with a good clear voice, and is a born story to ler. The lecture will be illustrated by unique in tern slides and cinematograph films, and the audience will also witness models of airships flying over their heads in the Hall; while other experiments will also be introduced to illustrate the principles of flying. The Chairman will be Rev. Wm. O'Leary, S.J., Director of the Seismological Observatory at Mungret College.
