DEATH OF DR. WM. MCCARTHY, ABBEYFEALE.

The death of Dr. Wm. M'Carthy, M.D., of Bridgemount, Abbeyfeale, which occurred last evening after a few days' illness of ceptic pneumonia, came as a great and painful shock to the people of Abbeyfeale, and will be learnt with great regret amongst the profession and the general public. Dr. M'Carthy was one of the most eminent members of the profession in Munster. His collegiate career was extremely brilliant, and availing of the traveling scholarship which he secured in his M.B. degree, he studied the latest methods of treatment adopted on the Continent and America. He was a distinguished pathologist, and his practical knowledge in this branch of the profession was repeatedly responsible for the prevention of many virulent diseases in West Limerick. Dr. M'Carthy may be said to have died a martyr to duty, as it was while attending some patients during the recent harsh frost and snow that he contracted the disease to which he succumbed at the age of 35.
