THE LATE DR. WM. MCCARTHY, ABBEYFEALE.

The funeral of the late Dr. Wm. McCarthy, Abbeyfeale, which took place a few days since for the family burial vault in the old Abbey cemetery was of immense proportions, and testified to the deep sorrow which prevails amongst all creeds and classes in the district at the premature demise of a gentleman who occupied a position of eminence in his profession, and whose generous and charitable disposition was one of his many excellent traits of character. THE INSURANCE ACT.

New Trial Motion.

The new trial motion in the case of Usher v. Usher, otherwise Caulfield, came on for hearing on Tuesday in the King's Bench Division, before the Lord Chief Justice, the Lord Chief Baron, and Mr. Justice Gibson. The petitioner, Mr. Wm. Usher, of Eastwell, Loughrea, had sought a decree of nullity of his marriage with the respondent, Mrs. Mary Usher (nee Caulfield). The action had been tried before Mr. Justice Kenny and a special jury, and Mr. Justice Kenny dismissed the petition. Against that decision, the present motion was brought. Mr. Henry, K.C., opened the case for the petitioner, and had not concluded when the Court adjourned.

Yesterday, the arguments were resumed. Sergeant Moriarty, for respondent, had not finished when the Court rose, and the case was adjourned until to-day.

QUEENSTOWN AND TRANSATLANTIC MAILS.

Mr. J. Milne Barbour, D.L., presided at a special meeting of the Belfast Chamber of Commerce. The report to Council stated that there was now reason to hope that the landing of the American mails at Queenstown by the Mauretania and the Lusitania may be resumed in the near future; and, if so, it will be necessary that a greater enterprise than has hitherto been exhibited shall be shown by the Great Southern and Western Railway Company, the Postal and the Queenstown authorities, in connection with the quick and convenient disembarkation of mails and passengers and their prompt transport to their destinations. A full mail service at Queenstown, in the opinion of the Council, cannot be maintained under present conditions.
