TRADE DISPUTES ACT.

The Board of Trade report of the proceedings under the Conciliation Trade Disputes Act during last year was issued to-day. It states that the number of workers involved in causing industrial stoppages was the highest on record. Action was taken under the Act in ninety-two cases, an increase on the previous year, due mainly to transport trade disputes. Of these fifty-seven involved stoppage of work, affecting over half a million of workpeople.
