INCORPORATED LAW SOCIETY.

County Court Practice.

At the half-yearly meeting of the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland on Thursday, at the Pour Courts, the President (Mr. Gerald Byrne) stated the negotiations that had taken place between their representative, Mr. F. J. Brady, M.P., and the Chief Secretary for Ireland with reference to proposed legislation for improving the procedure in County Courts. Mr. Birrell has asked for the views of the County Court Judges on the subject and, when they have been given, he has promised to submit them to the Incorporated Law Society. The meeting, by resolution, expressed the hope that the Government would at an early date introduce a Bill in Parliament dealing with the matter. A resolution was also passed deprecating the practice of permitting unqualified persons to appear in court for individuals or public bodies.
