TAILORS' WAGES IN THE LIME! UNION.

DEAR SIR,—Referring to a discussion at meeting of the Guardians of the Limerick I on the above subject, I consider it necessar draw attention to a very erroneous idea that to prevail with some of the members of the B No journeyman tailor is asked to work for per hour of 60 minutes. The word "hour" tailor's log is a unit of time, and a tailor can and does earn, two or even three such units hour of 60 minutes according to the class of he is employed at. If a working tailor ha work one hour of 60 minutes of the clock for and worked 54 hours per week, his wage Saturday night would be 20s. 3d., which is less than the Corporation pays its carters. ... sider the demand of 30s. per week for a taile perfectly just, if members of other trades empl in the Union are paid the same rate. Why sh a tailor be asked to work for less than any tradesman? Further, if any tailor works sistently for 54 hours a week in any of the w shops of the city he can earn that amount, as the Guardians want men to do their work, ought to pay them what they can earn outsid

Finally, it strikes me as extraordinary when workers seek an increase in their wag, public boards we have an effusive displa economy, but when officials seek an advance their salaries this economic sense is found want Is it because one is called, wages, and the ot
