## TRAGIC AFFAIR IN KILRUSH. \

## CAPT. HALL'S DREADFUL END

## The Inquest.

Our Kilrush correspondent wrote on Sundaypainful sensation was caused in the early hours of Sunday morning at Cappagh, Kilrush, when the report got abroad that Captain Frederick Hall, Inspector of Bailills, who well recently into occupation of Cappagh Lodge, had been found shot dead in his bedroom. Immediate investigation proved the rumour to be true. The deceased shot himself in bed with a six chambered deceased shot himself in bed with a six chambered ravolver, which was found by his side, and as the body was quite warm when aid came to hand, it is surmised that the set of self-destruction had duly occurred a few hours previously. Capt. Hall, who came to this district only three months ago in pursuance of his work as a fishery inspector under the Board of Conservators at Limserick, lived alone in a fine detached residence fronting the sea. He had the companionship of an intelligent little girl named Cises Haugh, whose he had additional. The child wont from her home in retween the Cappagh Lodge about seven o'clock on Sunisky morning, and according to custom at once proceeded to call up Lodge about seven o'clock on Sunday morning, and according to custom at once proceeded to call up her master, but on getting into the sleeping apartment found that he had passed away under tragic circumstances. The little girl with admirable coolness and self-possession, naturally under what must have been a terrible-shock to her, at once cycled to the district Constabulary barracks and communicated with the authorities. Head-Constable Shelley and some constables quickly got to Capsagh Lodge and took charge of the body, and notified the Coroner. Capt. Hall formerly held a communication in the Army in a creak regiment, but had been for a great number of years supervising the fisheries in both the upper and lower waters of the Shannon, with particular reference to stake weirs and drift note. He figured in manerous fishery proceoutions, being the chief witness in many cases where heavy fires or the foresitures of nete-vers imposed. Capt. Hall was an active official and much valued by his Board, and though of a retiring nature and disposition was regarded with esteem in the social circles in which he moved. A painful coourrence is brought to memory by the tragedy of Sunday morning.
