

The police showed the jury the bullet mark in region of the heart. There was no external injury. The six-chamber revolver, some inches from his right hand, was a Wedley service revolver.

The remains were identified by a nephew, Captain De Courcy Ireland, of the Royal Navy. He said that a prepossessing little child whom Captain Hall had adopted some three or four years ago and to whom he had made a present of a watch and some clothes, deposed that when she was taken to the room of the deceased gentleman at 12 o'clock on Sunday morning she found him dead. He had been in bed for three days previously with a cold. The head water-bailiff, McMahon, deposed he had a strong smell of powder on entering the apartment, and found the Captain dead, with the revolver by his side.

John F. Counihan, J.P., gave medical evidence that the deceased was dead two hours when he examined the body at 8 o'clock. He said that Captain Hall had not a sound heart and died from insomnia, and, from the result of the events probably, his mind was disturbed. Captain De Courcy Ireland, a sister of the deceased, widow of a County Inspector of Constabulary, had just arrived by motor from Tipperary, and mentioned that she had a letter from her brother on Wednesday last, in which he said he would be at her on Tuesday. That was quite understood as the gun accident to the servant girl at Ballinacorra at the end of February he had suffered from insomnia. He was greatly disturbed by that occurrence, and he was also very much affected by the sudden death last week of Mr. Gifford, secretary of the Board of Conservators. He went to go and see him and have a drink and some tea. She knew he had to take tablets from a doctor to induce sleep. He was expected to be in Limerick on Tuesday for the next meeting on Wednesday.

District Inspector Carroll put it to the doctor that the effect of what occurred fourteen weeks ago to the housekeeper at Ballinacorra, and other similar occurrences, greatly disturbed Captain Hall's mental balance, to which the medical witnesses replied probably.

The Head Constable said the deceased left no letters or papers that could throw any light on the matter. He found a cheque for £7, dated for Saturday last, in favour of Mrs. McMahon, aunt of Essie Haugh, left on a table.

The woman was called, and said she made a bad and did some washing for Captain Hall, which he paid her. He owed no money, and she could not explain the cheque.

In answer to the police, she said she received a cheque about a fortnight ago from the deceased, part payment of the expenses of the funeral of her sister, who met with the fatal revolver accident at Ballinacorra.

The jury, at the close of one hour's deliberation, found that Captain Hall died from a revolver shot inflicted, but from the evidence they were unable to say whether accidental or deliberate. A rider they offered sympathy to the relatives, which expression the Coroner joined.

The funeral of the late Captain Hall took place at Shanakyle, Kilrush, this (Tuesday) morning.
