THEATRE ROYAL.

"Macbeth."

"Macbeth," the finest of Shakespeare's tragedies, produced in the Theatre Royal last night by Mr. Alexander Marsh and his talented company. It was indeed pleasant to find the crowded Theatre Royal so well patronized. The generous response of the audience which we bespoke for the cultured actor realized last night, and let us hope it continued until Saturday night when the performance terminates. After all it is in the hands of the great Elizabethan dramatist that the mirror is pointed and the mirror held up to the world. We profit by a reading of any of his plays when presented by such a capable actor as Mr. Marsh, the good things more than make an impression. The production of "Macbeth" was at once a powerful study. Every scene was rendered with clearness, and the dramatic side of the play was great. Then again it suffers from want of proper stage machinery which were a feature of the presentation, the whole the work was as well done as an exacting student of Shakespearian drama could desire. In the name part Mr. Marsh added her successes, and was the recipient of many rounds of applause, while Miss Carrie gave a superb and critical interpretation of "Macbeth." Mr. Wilson-Gunning's "King Duncan" was capital, as was the "King Duncan" an Fleming. "Hamlet" will be presented, and we anticipate a large attendance, as well as on Friday night when the beautiful play "A Tale of Two Cities" will be given.

RAILWAY PROSECUTIONS AT LISTOWEL.

On Saturday, before Mr. J. W. Flanagan, R. M., and Messrs. John Creagh Harnett and Philip Healy, J.P.'s, two men named Denis Carroll and Joseph Jones, were prosecuted by the Great Southern and Western Railway Company for travelling without tickets and giving false names and addresses at Lixnaw Railway Station on the 8th of May last.

Mr. John Condon, solicitor, who prosecuted, stated that both the defendants were found by the Stationmaster at Lixnaw when he went to check tickets on the evening train from Tralee, under the seat of a carriage, and when brought out on the platform the gave false names and addresses.

Mr. O'Dwyer, the Stationmaster, having been examined as to the circumstances, the magistrates fined each of the defendants £2 and £1 4s. costs.

COUNTY LIMERICK ADMINISTRATION SUIT.

Yesterday, in the Chancery Division, before Mr. Justice Kenny (sitting for the Master of the Rolls), in the matter of the estate of Mary Anne Ryan, late of 5, Cecil-street, Limerick (Della O'Dea v. Ellen Cox and the Rev. Nicholas Dillon), Mr. Fitzgerald Kenny (instructed by Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan) applied on behalf of Miss O'Dea, of Newtown, Clarina, Limerick, for an order for administration of the deceased lady's estate, applicant being a legatee. By her will the testator left £150 to her cousin, Mrs. Ellen Cox, the defendant, or to her children in case she should die before the testator. Amongst the other legacies, altogether amounting to £765, was one of £25 to the plaintiff, and the residue was to go for additional masses not otherwise provided for. The testator left at her death debts amounting to £313, and there would not be sufficient balance to pay the legacies in full.

Mr. Michael Comyn (instructed by Mr. Killeen) appeared for Mrs. Ellen Cox, the other defendant, who was an executor having renounced. Mr. Justice Kenny granted the order asked for, and reserved the question of costs.

FUNERAL OF MRS. WHELAN.

The remains of the late Mrs. Whelan, whose death took place on Friday morning at 2 Sarsfield street, were laid to rest in St. Munchin's Cemetery on Sunday. The funeral left St. Michael's R. C. Church, at 3 o'clock, and was of very large dimensions, a fact which testified to the esteem and respect in which the deceased was held in the city.

The chief mourners were:—John Whelan (son); Denis Quirnan (brother); John O'Mara (son-in-law); and James O'Mara (nephew).

The clergy present were:—Rev. J. O'Connor, Adm., St. Michael's; Rev. J. O'Shea, C.C.; Rev. P. O'Mara, S.J.; and Rev. P. Hannan, C.C.

The general public included—The Mayor, the High Sheriff, S. O'Mara, and several members of the Borough Council.

Father O'Connor officiated at the graveside.

He was greatly distressed by that occurrence, and he was also very much put out by the sudden death last week of Hoaford, secretary of the Board of Conservators. He used to go and see him and have a chat and some tea. She knew he had taken tablets from a doctor to induce sleep. He intended to be in Limerick on Tuesday for the Board meeting on Wednesday.

District Inspector Carroll put it to the jury that the effect of what occurred fourteen weeks ago to the housekeeper at Ballinacorra, and of the recent occurrences, greatly disturbed Captain Hall's mental balance, to which the medical witness replied probably.

The Head Constable said the deceased left letters or papers that could throw any light on the matter. He found a cheque for £7, dated Saturday last, in favour of Mrs. McMahon, wife of Essie Haugh, left on a table.

The woman was called, and said she had bread and did some washing for Captain Hall for which he paid her. He owed no money, she could not explain the cheque.

In answer to the police, she said she received a cheque about a fortnight ago from the deceased in part payment of the expenses of the funeral of her sister, who met with the fatal revolver accident at Ballinacorra.

The jury, at the close of one hour's deliberation found that Captain Hall died from a revolver self-inflicted, but from the evidence they were unable to say whether accidental or deliberate. In a rider they offered sympathy to the relatives in which expression the Coroner joined.

The funeral of the late Captain Hall took place at Shanakyle, Kilrush, this (Tuesday) morning.

ELECTRIC LIGHT ENGINEER.

The Electric Light Committee met last night the Mayor presiding, and agreed to invite applications for the position of Electric Engineer, salary commencing at £200 per annum. An appointment becomes necessary through a vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. C. Cloran. The applications are to be with the Town Clerk by the 17th instant.
