### CORONER'S INQUEST.

An inquest was held at Barrington's Hospital, on Tuesday evening, by Mr. Coroner Barry and a jury, touching the death of a carpenter named Carroll, from Dublin, who, as reported in our last issue, died rather suddenly on Monday night.

Thomas Bourke, the carpenter who came to Limerick with Carroll on Monday from Dublin, stated deceased was about sixty years of age. They arrived for the purpose of entering the employment of Messrs. Kenny and Sons, builders. They had some stout during the day, and it was after leaving the Theatre that Carroll complained of feeling unwell. He had been crushed he said, getting out of the Theatre, and expressed a desire to go to hospital. He was conveyed to Barrington's Hospital, and did not speak on the way.

Dr. John Holmes, junior, resident surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, deposed to having made a post-mortem examination. Death was due to uremia.

Dr. Fogarty concurred, and the jury found that death was so caused.

(g) To make such rules as may be necessary for the proper working and management of the Association.

### THE TECHNICAL CONGRESS.

The Department's new examination scheme the question of commercial education, amongst the subjects dealt with at the Congress of the Irish Technical Instruction Commission in Cork on Tuesday. Sir Bert Windle, President, University College, presided.

In the course of his address, Sir Bert Windle referred to continuation schools, and that provision on an adequate financial basis, urgently needed if technical education were to achieve all that it might. He hoped that a Bill, if it came into being, would be provided with an adequate sum of money for satisfying educational needs of the country.
