## L.P.Y.M.A. AND INSURANCE ACT.

Mr. Archibald Murray, President of the P.Y.M.A., occupied the chair, at the lecture given by Dr. Seymour Stritch, of Dublin, representing the Union Friendly Society, in the Lecture Hall last night. There was a large attendance.

Dr. Stritch in opening, said it afforded him very great pleasure to come to Limerick to lecture. He had just been shown over the Association, and it was certainly second to none. He then delivered an exhaustive explanatory address on the Act. The lecturer referred to the various contributions which employe, employer, and the Government have to make. He said that the Union Friendly Society was started for Protestants only, so that Protestants in small places may be able to join a Society in which they would have the assurance that the very best possible return would be obtainable in case of claims, and that it would be administered on sound business lines by men of business experience and in sympathy with the members. Dr. Stritch said that he had personally nothing to gain by the matter. The patrons of the Union Friendly Society included the Lord Primate, the Archbishop of Dublin, and the heads of the Presbyterian, Methodist, and the other Protestant Churches in Ireland.

Quite a large number of questions were asked, to all of which Dr. Stritch gave frank and satisfactory replies.

On the motion of the Ven. Archdeacon Hackett, D.D., seconded by Rev. G. L. Webster, M.A., a resolution was passed recommending the Union Friendly Society to the Committee of the Association, which is to hold a meeting to-morrow (Friday) night to consider the matter finally.

A vote of thanks to Dr. Stritch brought the meeting to a close.

## FATAL ACCIDENT.

A girl named Gleeson, aged 16, died yesterday in the Workhouse [Hospital]. While engaged over the boiling of a pot of mangels at Patrickswell, on Tuesday evening, her clothing accidentally took fire, and there being nobody in the house, she ran to her grandfather who was digging in the garden attached to the house for assistance. He did what he could for the girl, and got burned in doing so. The girl was removed with all despatch to the Union Hospital, but she was found to be very badly injured, death ensuing yesterday. There is much sympathy with the girl's relatives over the sad occurrence.
