#### PORTER AND HIS HOLIDAYS.

The Clerk read a letter from the hall porter, Fred Shaughnessy, asking that the Board would kindly grant him the concession of allowing him every second Sunday during the summer. He referred to his long hours of duty, and that his health needed the change, his substitute to be paid by the Board, subject to the approval of the Local Government Board.

Mr. Hannon thought this a very reasonable application. Since he came there, a long time, he found the porter to be one of their hardest worked officials, and he had responsible duties.

It was decided to allow the porter every second Sunday throughout the year, giving his substitute 2s. 6d. a day, subject to the approval of the Local Government Board.

### THE BLOCK-PAVING SCHEME IN PATRICK-STREET.

At the meeting of the Improvement Department of the Corporation last night, the Mayor presiding, a deputation from the residents of Patrick-street attended to ask that the proposed block-paving of that thoroughfare be done with wood and not with stone, on the plea of the latter being likely to interfere with trade, etc., through reason of the noise it would cause. Mr. Peacocke, City Engineer, pointed out that wood-paving would be much dearer than stone. Soft stone would be 15s. per square yard, hard wood 20s., while the cost of stone would be but 18s. per square yard. After hearing Mr. Cole Nelson and others, the meeting decided to postpone the block-paving of Patrick-street until the other portions of the scheme were completed.
