amend the standing orders so as to limit the length of speeches in the House. Acting respectively for the Unionists and the Radicals, Captain Pretyman Newman and Mr. Catheart Wason took a poll of the members, and they have reported that I30 Liberals, 102 Unionists, 32 Labour men and 23 Nationalists agreed to the proposal that members desiring to take part in debates should give their names to the Speaker with an intimation of the time they would like to occupy Speaker before calling upon the member would announce the time allocated. Unly twelve members (10 Unionists and 2 Labour representatives), were against the proposal. Of course gentlemen occupying more or less of official positions could not be expected to express an opinion one way or the other and their neutrality accounts or most of the blank voting papers. The poll of 300 members, and the opinion indicated by it has beer considered so satisfactory that the Committee intend to bring the matter at once to the notice of the Prime Minister, and they are hopeful that he will move. It is certain that the House would dimit the duration of speeches for they all too frequently extend to a monotonous and quite unnecessary length.
