ENGLISH AVIATION DISASTER.

Officer and Sergeant Killed.

An aeroplane disaster occurred on Salisbury Plain yesterday morning, near Fargo Camp. Captain Eustace Loraine and Staff-Sergeant Wilson, of the Royal Flying Squadron, being dashed to the ground from a height of 600 feet. The Flying Corps staff witnessed the fall of the aeroplane, in which Sergeant Wilson was riding as a passenger, from Larkhall, and motor cars immediately rushed to the scene of the disaster. Both airmen succumbed to their injuries. At the inquest a verdict of accidental death was returned, the jury and coroner expressing sympathy with the relatives and friends of the deceased.

PRESENTATION TO THE BISHOP OF KILLALOE.

The newly appointed Bishop of Killaloe, the Right Rev. C. R. Dowse, D.D., was made last evening the recipient of an address and several gifts by the members of his former congregations of Christ Church, Leeson Park, and St. Columba's Church, Ranelagh. The presentation, which took place at Litton Hall, Leeson Park, was presided over by the Archbishop of Dublin, and there was a crowded attendance.

The Chairman, in opening the proceedings, said that, first of all, he would like to say that it gave him very great pleasure to be present and join in offering a farewell and token of the respect and loving regard with which they held, and do hold, their late pastor, the Bishop of Killaloe. As a pastor, as a preacher, and as a minister, he had opened his heart to all his people, and laboured assiduously for his parish.

Mr. R. V. Dixon read an address presented to the Bishop of Killaloe by the congregation of Christ Church, Leeson Park, St. Columba's Church, and by the supporters of Molyneux Asylum for the female blind.

The Chairman then presented the Bishop of Killaloe with the address and a cheque and a hall rug chest from the united congregations of Christ Church and St. Columba's Church, and an episcopal ring from the lady workers, and to Mrs. Dowse a wardrobe and a handsome lamp, the latter being from the Girls' Friendly Society.

The Bishop of Killaloe, in acknowledging the presentation, said that it was difficult for him to express at all adequately his feelings of gratitude for the kind words and valuable gifts which accompanied them. He owed much to the members of the two congregations for friendship generously given, and for help freely offered in the various departments of parochial life. From the men of the Asylum Board, and from the members of the Select Vestry he learned much in council, and the experience he gained from association with them would be of the utmost value to him in his new work. THE BELFAST DISTURBANCES.

More Workers Attacked.

A Belfast correspondent writes that the great indignation and party bitterness which has been created by the Hibernian attack on the Sunday school excursion party at Castledawson is the cause of grave anxiety amongst the responsible leaders of both parties in Belfast, and every effort is being made to calm the rising party feeling, and restrict the present disturbances within narrow limits.

Disturbances in Belfast were renewed yesterday, when a body of youths, apparently connected with the shipyards, rushed into the Sirocco Engineering Works, owned by Messrs Davidson and Co., Bridge End, entered the foundry and maltreated several of the Roman Catholic employes. The youths were afterwards forced to leave the works.

C.L.B. "ALL-IRELAND CAMP."

THE ROYAL IRISH REGIMENT.

Col. D. M. Thompson, who has retired in his fifty-first year, joined the 18th Royal Irish Regiment in January, 1880, and took part in the concluding stages of the Afghan War during that year (medal), and he also served with the Sikkim Expedition of 1888 (medal with clasp). Transferring to the Indian Staff Corps in January, 1891, he was subsequently appointed to the Supply and Transport Corps. During the South African War, Col. Thompson was on the staff as D.A.A.G., and took part in the defence of Ladysmith, when he was mentioned in despatches by Sir George White.

Knigh of Glin v. Patrick Leal
The Knight of Glin was respondent in brought against Patrick Leahy, to being one year's interest on £200 drawn to the 25th March, 1911. The case of his Honor Judge Law-Smith at the Quarter Sessions on the 12th April last decree for the amount claimed was given.

Mr. R. Holmes (instructed by Mess Fitt and Co., solicitor) appeared for the plaintiff; and Mr. P. Kelly (instructed by Kenney, solicitor) represented the appellant. Evidence having been given, and the judgment heard, his lordship intimated that he would state a case for further argument.

McKeavy v. Walker.
Thomas W. McKeavy appealed from the decision of the County Court Judge at the Quarter Sessions in April last dismissing an action instituted against William Walker for damages for trespass and cutting and removal of the hedge the privacy of his was affected, and shelter interfered with.

The respondent's case was that there was injury caused to the hedge, the branches were merely lopped off, as they overhung the meadow.

His Lordship affirmed the dismissal.

Keane v. Fitzgerald.
This was an appeal by William Keane County Court Judge at Newcastle West, of an action instituted for 30s. damages for trespass, Michael Fitzgerald's case.

Evidence having been given, the Court affirmed the decision of the court below, and gave judgment for the amount claimed less four shilling.

Normoyle v. Ruddle.
Richard Normoyle was respondent in an action by David Ruddle from a decree for £2, his Honor County Court Judge Law Smith damages for obstruction to a watercourse case was heard at the Rathkeale Quarter Sessions in January last, when £5 damages were given.

The Court reversed the decision of the court below.

Hartnett v. G S & W R.
Ellen L. Hartnett was appellant in an action of the County Court Judge at Newcastle West in April last, against a given to the Great Southern and Western Railway Company, who were proceeded for £14 for loss of a cow through, as defendants' negligence in January of this year.

Evidence having been tendered, his lordship affirmed the dismissal.

Leahy v. McAuliffe.
James D. Leahy, C.R., Newcastle West, was respondent in an appeal brought by McAuliffe, Abbeyfeale, for professional services rendered in 1910 and 1911. The County Court Judge at Newcastle West in June last decree for £9 6s., with 14s. expenses.

The Court affirmed the decree.

Quilter v. Condon.
Margaret Quilter, domestic servant, a from a decision of the County Court Judge at Rathkeale, dismissing an action instituted against Patrick Condon, farmer, for £20 for breach of contract.

Mr. Coughlan (instructed by Mr. Power, solicitor, Kilmallock), appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. D. R. Sherlock (instructed by P. Ryan, solicitor Charleville), for defendant.
