

### BELFAST AND HOME RULE.

# Chamber of Commerce Deputation to Mr. Asquith.

Mr. Asquith received at the House of Commons yesterday a deputation from the Belfast Chamber of Commerce, which laid before him the views of the commercial community of Belfast regarding the Home Rule Bill.

Replying, he expressed disappointment that the speakers had not indicated in what respect they considered the safeguards inadequate, and how they would desire them to be supplemented. It was unprofitable to argue the question whilst they maintained the position that no safeguards, however carefully devised and honestly intended, that statesmanship and Parliamentary ingenuity and wisdom could suggest, would reconcile them to the creation of an Irish Parliament. The Government honestly desired to effect a real settlement of the Irish question.

### THE CASTLEDAWSON AFFAIR.

### Several Men Charged.

Yesterday at Magherafelt twenty-seven Nationalists and nine Unionists were charged with-unlawful assembly and riot at Castledawson on June 29th, when a conflict occurred between a party of Hibernians and a Presbyterian Sunday School party from Whitehouse, Belfast. The Court, on the application of the solicitors for the defence, adjourned the hearing till 22nd instant.

### An Exciting Contest.

With the polling now definitely fixed for Saturday at Hanley, the contest is being waged with great vigour by the three candidates.
